I am an interdisciplinary LA based artist that works with paintings, print media, digital media, and artist books. My work embraces the art tradition from Mesoamerica to explore how historical events are interconnected and reverberate into the present. My work blends pre-Columbian iconography, generational myths, oral folklore, and contemporary pop culture to collapse the centuries separating the different artforms. My palette, depiction of the human body and surreal environments are influenced by the surviving pre-Columbian codices, murals, and ceramic figurines to affirm my presence as a Chicano in the United States, and to reclaim my indigenous history.

As a Chicano, I inherit the cultures of Mexico and the United States but remain separate from both. I explore this amalgamation throughout my work to celebrate my intimate experience with both cultures and to examine the post-colonial histories of both places. My work seeks to reveal the present as the inevitable outcome of interconnected past events and decisions. By seeing the past clearly, we can ask the right questions of the present to actively shape the future.

I'm an interdisciplinary artist working within the mediums of sculpture, drawing, and assemblage to explore themes of gender, family, home, and place. Central to my practice is an investigation of the interplay between the natural world, the built environment, and how these spaces structure our bodies and identities. Through the manipulation of found objects, geographic and symbolic histories of the materials, these materials engage in conversation with personal and familial narratives, recontextualizing them and creating a space to reflect on one's own relationships with these objects.

I'm inspired by the detritus of everyday life, notably "disposable" packing materials, which often serve as a starting point. My work explores color, texture, and space. It reflects popular culture and the everyday vernacular.

Spending some of my childhood in my parents' small rural town in Zacatecas, taught me the importance of place and connecting with the natural environment. Growing up in Los Angeles, I've alway searched for connection and belonging in nature and looking for echoes of the past by recording histories through my images. Some of these touch on the impact of politics, ecology and social unrest. Each piece I make is a voice to memory, an artistic artifact recalling words that fade with time and a celebration of the survival of a culture.

Part 1 (2022) and part 2 (2022) are two collaborative films by artists Sam Kann (she/they) and Jack Herscowitz (he/him) filmed on two separate locations on unceded Chumash land. Kann's and Herscowitz's collaborative work reflects their personal relationships to spontaneity: reclaiming joy in art making through improvisation and intense short-term working sessions. These films constitute the first entries in their growing body of landscape performance films, in which ostensibly simple and ultimately impossible text-based instructions unfold into long-form improvisations by both the artists and the land. These performances investigate the relationship between scores and place, questioning the egotistical futility of the score as an act of domination and postulating a responsive performance practice guided by the complete environmental situation rather than directive instructions. The score which we wrote to suggest these performances was: "do less."

Making A Drawing is a two-hour performance documented on video. Throughout the performance, I created circular movements on an indigo-dyed canvas using a custom-made mobile tool constructed from found objects. This tool, made by connecting a rubber caster wheel and a dowel, was initially designed as a walking aid but was repurposed to facilitate the drawing process. While the wheel guided the drawing, at times it took control of the movements. The performance concluded due to a shortage of ink, a mixture of water-based materials and natural dye, as well as my physical fatigue. The video captures my exploration of the color blue and its relationship to drawing and performance in my practice. Focused on the notions of duration and repetition in relation to the body and space, the act of turning around oneself creates an illusion of uncertainty and absurditu.

The time I spent during 2018 to 2021 simultaneously being a graduate student, teaching children how to visually tell their own stories, and my experiences in and with the Barnsdall community, overall have inspired my work, and particularly my comics, more than I can ever truly express.

The work shown here is from my narrative art collection from my final MFA show, "Calla and the Dark Woods". I love exploring the combination of traditional rendering inherent in scientific illustration, with the more cartoony/experimental world of Comics and Children's Books, through the flora, fauna, characters, and narratives I create.

In Los Angeles, the city becomes electric when it gets dark. For artist Monica Nouwens, it's these hours after sunset when Los Angeles is most vibrant and alive in its diversity and spirit. Nouwens' body of work consists of her experiences after dark on the streets of South East Los Angeles and is, in many ways, a love letter to the City of Angels.

Shot in a distinctly cinematic aesthetic reminiscent of old Hollywood noir, Nouwens captures the faces and scenes of those Los Angelinos who contribute to the cultural mosaic of the city.

Nouwens is a fellow of the Rijksakademie in Amsterdam and an exchange student at CalArts. She taught at UCI, CalArts, SCI_Arc, University of Leiden, Otis College, Sandberg institute, Amsterdam and UDEM, Mexico. Nouwens exhibited at The Nederlands Fotomuseum, Rainbow in Spanish Gallery, Photography Museum Amsterdam, Stedelijk Museum, The Wende Museum, and J. Paul Getty Museum.

I enjoy experimenting with different creative processes. These works are representations of things that I care about; utilizing natural dyes and fabrics, resist dyeing, upcycling, and low to zero waste pattern making within the design process. I created the pattern for both pieces, and piece hand dyed the tote bag using persimmon dye, while the sweatshirt was piece hand dyed using Japanese mud dyes before sewing them together. The trim used on the outside of the tote bag was bought from local Los Angeles suppliers selling end of roll and remnants. The straps are 100% hemp webbing, while the lined tote bag is organic cotton and hemp. The sweatshirt is also a hemp and organic cotton blend.

Since 1946, Barnsdall Arts Center (BAC) has cultivated a space for adults to discover a passion for creativity through various art forms. The BAC aims to enrich the lives of everyday people with its affordable yet substantial artmaking classes. Through artmaking, the center strives to connect various cultures together and build a vibrant, inclusive arts community.

For over 70 years, the BAC has earned its reputation for challenging instruction in a small informal class setting and the atmosphere of a community of artists. This program of extremely popular classes in the visual and performing arts is presented by Teaching artists drawn from the art departments of prestigious colleges and universities, art schools, and other exemplary institutions. Many Teaching Artists are working professionals whose work is exhibited locally, nationally and internationally.

Drawing, painting, ceramics, jewelry, fiber art, photography and more are the primary disciplines offered. Workshops in various art forms provide additional richness, and the uninstructed life-drawing workshops provide independent work from the model to advanced students and professional artists.

Barnsdall Junior Arts Center (BJAC) nurtures the imaginations of children and young people in their artistic development. A fixture of the Los Angeles arts education community since 1967, BJAC continues to build on its national reputation as one of only a few distinguished institutions devoted to excellence, originality, public service, and artistic creativity. The center's small, dynamic classes support families, children, and young people in discovering their creative processes in mediums ranging from visual to performing arts. 


Barnsdall Junior Arts Center Gallery (BJACG) fosters a vibrant creative community by welcoming all to experience the arts, creativity, and culture.
